


Size of Razia's Empire - almost the whole of India





 One of the most famous female business success stories is the Shri Mahila Griha Udyog Lijjat Papad. In 2006, Kiran Mazumdar-Shaw, who started Biocon - one of India's first biotech companies, was rated India's richest woman. Lalita Gupte and Kalpana Morparia (both were the only businesswomen in India who made the list of the Forbes World's Most Powerful Women), run India's second-largest bank, ICICI Bank Chanda Kochar

 Over 32000 murders, 19,000 rapes, 7500 dowry deaths and 36500 molestation cases are the violent crimes reported in India in 2006 against women. There are many instances of crime especially against women go unreported in India. These are figures released by the National Crime Records Bureau recently. While Madhya Pradesh is worst off among the states, the national capital New Delhi continues to hold on to its reputation of being the most unsafe city in India. Delhi takes the top slot for crimes ranging from murders and rapes to dowry deaths and abductions.



<u>Women</u>



 There are far fewer women in the paid workforce than there are men. In urban India Women have impressive number in the workforce. As an example at software industry 30% of the workforce is female. They are at par with their male counter parts in terms of wages, position at the work place. In rural India, agriculture and allied industrial sectors employ as much as 89.5% of the total female labour.

- Crimes against women- Increase of Crimes
- Sexual harassment
- Half of the total number of crimes against women reported in 1990 related to molestation and harassment at the workplace
- **Dowry** In 1961, the Government of India passed the Dowry Prohibition Act- A 1997 report claimed that at least 5,000 women die each year because of dowry deaths **Domestic violence- Trafficking**

Meira Kumar: The first woman Speaker of Lok Sabha.

Indian Women In Politics

- Mayawati is an Indian politician. She served four terms as the 17th Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh as head of the Bahujan Samaj Party, which focuses on a platform of social change to improve the welfare
- Mayawati's rise from humble beginnings has been called a "miracle of democracy" by P. V. Narasimha Rao, former Prime Minister of India.

Indian Women In Politics

 Mamata Banerjee born 11th July 1960 is the 8th and current Chief Minister of West Bengal. She is the first woman to hold the office. Banerjee founded the party All India Trinamool Congress (AITMC or TMC) in 1997 and became its chairperson, after separating from the Indian National Congress. She is usually being called *Didi* (meaning *elder sister* in Bengali). In 2011 Banerjee pulled off a landslide victory for the TMC Congress alliance in West Bengal by defeating the world's longest-serving democratically-elected communist government, the Communist Party of India (Marxist)-led Left Front government, bringing to an end 34 years of Left Front rule in the state

- M D Valsamma, Athlete: The third Indian woman to win an individual Gold medal at the Asian Games and the first to win it on Indian soil.

Indian Women Cricket

 Mithali Raj is the captain of the Indian cricket team and holds the world record of scoring highest number of runs in an innings, 214.(scored against England)

Jaya sharma holds the record of scoring highest run in One Day for India, 138 not out (scored against Pakistan)

Jhulan Goswami, India's fast bowler was recently awarded ICC best player award. She is the fastest bowler in the women circuit.

- Meera Shankar: India's ambassador to the United states. The only Indian woman to be appointed Indian ambassador to US since Vijayalakshmi Pandit.
- Nirupama Rao: The Indian woman full term foreign Secretary in India's history. She is handling the ongoing dialogue with Pakistan. She was the first woman spokesperson of the ministry of external Affairs.

- Deepa Gopalan Wadhwa: The first woman envoy to Qatar.
- Sujatha Singh: Indian High commision in Australia. Ruchi
- Ghanashyam: India's high commissioner to Ghana. she was the first woman officer to be posted to Islamabad at a time when harassment of Indian diplomats was a routine.
- Chokila lyer: The first Indian woman foreign secretary (2001).

- Kiran Majumdar Shaw: MD of Biocon India.
 She is the wealthiest entrepreneur of India.
 She was the first women awarded by FCCI
- Chanda Kochar: CEO & Managing Director, ICICI Bank. She is ranked number 20 on the Forbes list of 100 most powerful women in the world.
- Indra Krishnamurthy Nooyi: Chairman and Executive Officer of Pepsico.

INDIAN WOMEN IN IT

- Today almost one third of the employees of the Indian software companies are females.
- Padmashree Warrior: Chief technology officer, CISCO Systems Inc. Under her leadership, her company has taken huge strides. Recently the United states Pan Asian American chamber of commerce recognisd her with its prestigious Excellence award.
- Dr.Sunita Maheshwari: Paediatric Cardiologist and Co-founder, Teleradiology Solutions: A Yaletrained pediatric cardiologist cofounded the first healthcare outsourcing IT company in India.

• Kiran Bedi: An Indian social activist and a retired Indian Police service, IPS. Kiran bedi is the first Indian women to join the IPS in 1972, and most recently held the position of Director General BPR&D, Minsitry of Home affairs. She retired in 2007.



 After retirement, Kiran Bedi launched a new website, www.saferIndia.com, on January 3, 2007. The motto of this website is to help people whose complaints are not accepted by the local police. This project is undertaken by the nonprofit, voluntary and non-government organization she founded, the India Vision Foundation. She is active with the AM ADMI Party

- Naina Lal Kidwai: Vice Chairperson and Managing Director of HSBC Securities and Capital Market. She has taken HSBC India to startling new heights even during the recession. First Indian Women to graduate from Harvard Business School.
- Swati Piramal: Director, Piramal health care, President, ASSOCHAM: She has become the first Indian women to head an apex business chamber in India. Since her appointment, she has invited around 100 of womens to chair all the national committes of ASSOCHAM.

Sangeeta Talwar: Executive Director, TATA Tea, Creator of the Ad: Jaago Re", runs one of the biggest brand and image management companies for celebrities.



Indian Women Outstanding World

Mother Teresa: Internationally famed as a humanitarian and advocate for the poor and helpless. She won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979 and India's highest civilian honour, the Bharat Ratna, in 1980 for her humanitarian work. Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity continued to expand, and at the time of her death it was operating 610 missions in 123 countries, including hospices and homes for people with HIV/AIDS, leprosy and tuberculosis, soup kitchens, children's and family counselling programs, orphanages, and schools.
